

Great State Seal of Iowa

Activity Overview: Did you know that Iowa has a state seal? This activity has young historians creating and designing their own colorful Great State Seal of Iowa. What images would you pick to showcase the state?

Connection to Iowa History

A seal is an image or collection of combined images that represent a location and the people living in the space. Iowa's official Great State Seal was designed and approved by the General Assembly in 1847, one year after Iowa became a state. The seal has little changes or alterations from the original design. The Iowa governor has to approve all use of the state seal, and it cannot be used without their permission.

Closer Look

The state seal captures what lowans wanted to highlight about their new state. Since it was designed many years ago, some of the images and items depicted may no longer be relevant to modern lowans. Let's take a closer look at what images were chosen for the Great Seal of lowa:

- · A citizen soldier
- A bushel of wheat and a farm plow to represent agriculture
- A bundle of lead to show the importance of lead mining
- Steamboat lowa to represent trading and transportation along the river
- The state motto is also included within the symbol

- 2 **Take notes.** Answer the provided questions to gain a better understanding of the image. Why do you think the seal was designed this way?
- 3 **Brainstorm.** Using the provided prompts, write your answers to the questions to help develop the design of your own version of lowa seal.
- 4 **Create.** Draw and color your own version of the lowa seal using the provided drawing space. Be creative and make sure to represent lowa in your design!



Directions: Use the questions below to examine the Great Seal of Iowa. Look closely at the current design choices. What does the design tell you about the state it represents?
