Primary Sources Primary sources are first-hand accounts of your topic created by people or organizations with direct connections to your topic. <i>Primary sources provide multiple perspectives about your topic from people who were there.</i> Examples: Letters, diaries, newspaper articles (written during the time period you are researching), photographs, maps, political cartoons, paintings

Secondary Sources Secondary sources are accounts of your topic that were not written first-hand by people or organizations with direct connections to your topic. <i>Secondary sources provide descriptions, summaries, analyses, and interpretations of your topic.</i> Examples: Books, scholarly articles, newspaper articles (written after the time period you are researching), websites
