UNDERGROUND RAILROAD.

Nine fugitives escaped from Boone Co., Ky., on the 27th ult. Their masters followed them to Cincinnati, where they offered a reward for their apprehension. We are happy to say, that as yet they have not been called upon to pay it over.

Seven fugitives, two men, three women, and two children, arrived safe at Detroit, on Friday morning last.

Conductors in Cleveland report to Frederick Douglas' Paper as follows:

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 4, '54.

The quarterly report of the business on the Underground Railroad, from Cleveland, for the past three months, has been such as to increase the confidence of all parties connected therewith.

Number of passengers passed over the road, 176

Receipts of the road from all sources, \$309.37

Cash on hand, \$19.30

Monthly subscribers to this Committee since the ninth of May up to the 9th of August, 228

We have paid out fifty-nine dollars and thirty-seven cents, for which we have received the large sum of \$35,000, according to the way the American people buy and sell God's image in the Southern States; and we, therefore, resolve as a Committee of men and women, never to take down our flag as long as the Underground Railroad cars shall move on invisibly, for God is on our side.
